HOUSE BILL 1269 Prohibiting Handguns/Concealed Weapons into Government SENATE
BILL 1556 Buildings

This bill has statewide implications and is not limited to government buildings and facilities in Broward County as specified in House Bill 1147. This bill creates an exception to the preemption of regulation of firearms to the legislature to allow state agencies and local government to prohibit possession of concealed firearms at publicly sanctioned or sponsored events in public buildings or at government-sponsored outdoor public venues.

SENATE BILL 540
HOUSE BILL 885 Local Ordinances Regulating Secondary Metals Recyclers

This bill preempts local ordinances regulating secondary metals recyclers adopted after March 1, 2012. This bill provides additional restrictions on secondary metals recyclers and the sale of secondary metals. The bill also grandfathers existing local ordinances and allows cities to amend ordinances on the books prior to March 1, 2012.

Senate Bill 540 is in the Senate Budget Subcommittee on governmental appropriations while House Bill 885 passed the House Judiciary Committee and Economic Affairs Committee and is not on the House calendar.

SENATE BILL 514
HOUSE BILL 1227 Certification for Public Safety Telecommunicators

This bill would exempt sworn Police Officers assigned to telecommunication duties from the Public Safety Telecommunicator Certification Course provided that the Officer can pass the basic certification exam. This bill provides local government with the authorization to use sworn law enforcement in the temporary capacity of a public safety telecommunicator upon passing the certification exam.

Senate Bill 514 is already on the Senate calendar while House Bill 1227 has already passed the House by a unanimous vote.

SENATE BILL 916
HOUSE BILL 629 Public Records Exemption for Law Enforcement

This bill creates a public records exemption for a law enforcement officer's date of birth information and for their department-issued and personal cell phone numbers. House Bill 629 has already passed the House by a nearly unanimous vote while Senate Bill 916 has passed the Senate Criminal Justice Committee and is destined for the Senate floor.
